

# **EDUCATIONAL OFFICER**

The movie Dunkirk is out in theatres this month. In 1940, before the US entered World War II, the allied forces had been pushed back to the town of port of Dunkirk and were on the brink of being forced to surrender or be destroyed. With almost 400,000 troops stranded and not enough ships the British called on every private boat that could sail across the English Channel and back again. Many of these were recreational boats or fishing boats and in many cases the skipper of the boat volunteered. Other boats were manned by makeshift crews and volunteers. The fact that these were civilians in civilian boats offered them no protection from the Germans. Many crew members were killed and many small were sunk or destroyed.

These boaters had to put all their navigation skills to good use. Although the English coast was within sight of Dunkirk the evacuation routes did not go directly across the Channel. They had to navigate unfamiliar waters, through night and day and do it by dead reckoning. Back then that would probably be a poor choice of words. Maybe "Seat of your pants" would have been better. But it simply means there are no visual aids and you are doing everything by how fast the boat is going and your compass heading.

The students who just completed the piloting course can appreciate this. Of course our OTW (on the water) class only had to dodge crab pots – not mines, artillery and enemy aircraft. Our education courses still start with the basics that they needed 77 years ago.

Some of the boats that participated in the evacuation are still around and you can find out more about them from the Association of Dunkirk Little Ships. [www.adls.org.uk](http://www.adls.org.uk) Many of these are still active as privately owned yachts. In fact twelve of the original boats were used in the filming of the movie.

Back to the present - The Piloting course has completed and the tests have been sent in to be graded. Hopefully we will have results soon. There will be a makeup exam for anyone who did not get a chance to take the exam the first time around or needs to retake it. I will coordinate the date with the instructor and students. Stay safe out there and keep learning

### More on Boating Activities

I mentioned last month that there are LOTS of boating activities. My moving on-the-water time is about to greatly increase and, hopefully, displace the on-the-land activities. I had my boat on land last week with several projects. I hoped to finish in 3-4 days because after a week, the fees come by the foot. I ended up using every last minute of my time allowance. I also drank just about everything on board. When this is read, you may have forgotten how hot it was. The heat made for a slower pace.

A word of advice for boat owners: Check your thru hulls. One of my main projects was to do just that. I had 39 year old gate valves throughout the boat when proper seacocks or balls valves are current technology. I had 4 gate valves as thru hulls and 4 plastic transducers (one functional). The brass thru hulls all had a tinge of pink indicating a weakening of the bronze. The plastic transducers all showed a certain amount of wear. One gate valve that I thought was closed was actually half open with a nonfunctioning turning handle. This was attached to a pinched off hose in the head. I feel lucky.

Also mentioned last month, I recently became a Vessel Safety Examiner (VSE). On my leisurely 3 hour indirect cruise back from the boat yard, I was boarded by the US Coast Guard for the first time. I was safely moving at 5.9 mph in the inner harbor. I believed I was fully current with everything, but still, it puts one on alert. It was really a non-event with me anticipating their needs with my new VSE skills. I did find one blip. Although I am required to have 2 fire extinguishers, I would have bet money I had a third one in the forward sleeping area just like we suggest during a VSE. Sigh.

Our presenter for August will be will be Mr. Erhard Koehler, manager of programs for the Nuclear Ship Savannah which is harbored right here in Baltimore! If you come across someone that the squadron might enjoy please feel to drop a line and I'll attempt to make contact. Looking forward to Rock Hall!

G'day', sailors! Lots happening in the dark and glamorous world of minutes-taking! However, I am sworn to secrecy so I can't tell you all of the scintillating tales of splendor and woe that I could relate (hah, we do hear EVERYTHING). So, in lieu of the mysteries of record-keeping, here are some items from my boating and Homeland Security Committee agenda:

July 4th Safety: For the second consecutive year, the Fourth of July holiday ended without a boating fatality, the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Police reported. Statewide there were 15 boating accidents, an increase of three over 2016, and officers arrested 12 boaters for operating under the influence of alcohol, the same number as last year. The most serious boating accident occurred in Ocean City Saturday July 1 when a Kawasaki personal watercraft struck the Route 90 bridge around 4:30 p.m. It was determined that the bridge was not at fault, so the operator received citations.

High and Dry: From June 30 through July 2, DNR's police unit teamed up with the U.S. Coast Guard for Operation Dry Water, a 9 year old national campaign to crackdown on impaired boating. Saturation patrols focused on high-traffic areas and traditional hot spots. Since its inception, the campaign has resulted in 82 arrests. Officers issued 526 citations during the holiday, a 6.2 percent increase over 2016. Tickets were issued for violations such as: exceeding the 6-knot speed limit, insufficient number of life jackets, a lack of boat safety equipment, and exceeding crabbing and fishing limits. So obviously there is a need for our continued educational service out there!

S/V Certainty: On a personal note, we were delayed getting dear Certainty, the Skipper's Rhodes 22, into the drink, as we were consolidating our households. It was an experience not unlike trying to fit 20 pounds of potatoes in a 5 pound sack...that was already full of potatoes. But she's in her slip at Parkside Marina on Frogmortal Creek, and Old Faithful, her 1981 9.9 hp Evinrude, ran like a champ. Let the fun begin!

So, keep an eye on the weather, and safe boating!!!

**TREASURER'**

We hear often these days that politics has never been nastier, that our leaders in Washington have never been meaner. But July 11, the date upon which I write this, reminds us that public discourse, from the very beginning of our Republic, has been vigorous, vicious, and vulgar.

Just 28 years after our Declaration of Independence, at dawn on July 11, 1804, the sitting Vice-President of the United States, Aaron Burr, and the former Secretary of the Treasury, Alexander Hamilton, met in a duel to settle, once-and-for-all, their political differences. Vice-President Burr had recently run for governor of New York, and General Hamilton (a rank he attained in the Revolutionary War) had accused Burr repeatedly of terrible things – of favoring his own business interests over the nation, of personal corruption, of exaggerating his military record, and of being “a profligate, a voluptuary in the extreme.”

Hamilton had already survived ten duels during his career, often because no shots were fired. But Burr had a different plan, and Hamilton died the next day from a shot to his abdomen, leaving behind seven children (his eldest son had died in a duel 2 ½ years earlier), and his wife, Elizabeth Schuyler Hamilton, who survived her husband by more than 50 years! As for Burr, after a brief period in hiding, he was acquitted of murder and returned to Washington, DC to complete his term as Vice President. In the turmoil of his time, he presided over the impeachment trial of Samuel Chase, a justice of the Supreme Court, in the United States Senate.

It is reassuring that the tumultuous times in which we live are not unique, that our Nation is strong not in spite of, but because of vigorous, and sometimes vicious and vulgar debate. And for those who will ask what this article has to do with my Squadron office, well, there is a natural affinity between the treasurer of any organization and our Nation's first and greatest Secretary of the Treasury.

But, even more so, in the early morning hours of July 11, 1804, Vice-President Burr and General Hamilton departed from Manhattan, and crossed the Hudson River, in boats. History might have been different if only they had known, like us, the camaraderie of America's Boating Club.


